Dear Fellow Members:

I hope you were able to enjoy the Park this Summer. Many did. It was a busy summer, and attendance at the Park continued to increase. Often, parking was at a premium; but relief is on the way. By next Spring, the parking area by the red barns will be paved and new parking will be added. We look forward to its completion. Another project in the works is the replacement of the roof on the Guest House near the Mansion. Friends has committed \$10,000 toward the cost of this project, which we hope will be completed this Fall, weather permitting.

Summer developments of note: Kathleen York, our first Executive Director, joined the team and hit the ground running. (Her initial offering to our Newsletter appears in this issue.) Kathleen is housed in the Friends' newly opened office, which is located on the second floor of the Park Office Building. The renovation of the gardens in front of the Mansion and the installation of the nearby Betsy Graves Memorial Garden were completed. If you have not seen them, I encourage you to stop by. Special thanks to our Garden Club and Board member Carlie Graves for their efforts in the planning of these projects. Many new benches were installed throughout the Park as part of our memorial bench program, administered by Paul Babbitt. And, of course, our fourth annual Bark Bash was held at the Park on August 4th.

By all accounts, Bark Bash was a great success. We do not have a count of the actual attendance, but we do know that nearly 1,900 vehicles entered the Park that day. Our thanks to our Bark Bash Committee, chaired by Board member Rachel Stepien (who conceived the event in the first instance), to all our many volunteers, to the participating vendors and pet shelters, and last, but not least, to Park Manager Andy Hillman and his staff, for making the event possible. Through these efforts, we raised more than \$10,000 that day. More important, in light of our mission, was the number of visitors to the Park that day, many of whom were there for the first time. We look forward to the fifth edition of the Bash next summer.

Our next project is the Holiday Arts and Crafts Show at the Mansion on Saturday and Sunday, November 9th and 10th. The Art Show's Committee, under the leadership of Marcia McNallie, has been hard at work in preparation. The Mansion will be filled with exhibitors displaying their wares. This Show has always been one of our more popular events. I am certain this year will be no exception. We hope to see you there. Details are on our website.

Finally, I should inform you that our annual Membership Meeting will convene at 5:30 p.m. on October 29 at the Mansion. Our speaker for the evening will be Mark Mistretta, NYS Parks Western Regional Director. The evening also will include the President's annual report, a financial report by our Treasurer, Donna Lough, action to approve a technical amendment to the corporation's Certificate of Incorporation, and the election of five directors (three incumbents and two new directors). Biographical information regarding the candidates will be included with the formal notice of the meeting, which will be mailed to members in the next week or so. An informal buffet dinner will follow the meeting. If you are not able to attend the meeting in person, we would urge you to submit a Proxy so that we will be assured of a quorum. The Proxy form will be included with the meeting notice.

From the Park Manager

Hello Friends Group members! It's been a busy summer at the park and attendance has been especially high with the great weather. Dog Park users, photographers (for weddings, proms, engagements, senior pictures, etc.), walkers, runners, picnickers, cyclists, birders & nature enthusiasts have all been out in full force. The estimated attendance from June 1st to August 31st was 136,000! The increasing popularity of the park has made accomplishing some of the basic maintenance tasks a challenge, especially in areas like the dog park. We make every attempt to conduct maintenance and projects during off peak times and the brief periods of lower usage, but this isn't always possible. Thank you for your patience and understanding when these activities are underway!

Lots of work has recently been accomplished by Niagara Regional Parks crews at the Stable complex including repair of rotted and crumbling arches on the back of the building, replacement of broken missing clay roof tiles, replacement of leaking cast iron wastewater lines, and repair of many broken window panes. The work has come out great and we look forward to more progress with these beautiful buildings.

Knox Farm State Park staff have been conducting several projects this summer. In the dog park, a new gate was installed, and paddock fencing was replaced at the main entrance near the sheep barn. An entrance paddock with gate was installed in the "back" large dog area to help make the transition safer. Water lines were run and frost-free water spigots installed in both of the large dog areas. Park staff also installed 5 concrete pads and assembled benches for the Friends "Memorial Bench" program. The benches are located throughout the park in locations that provide a rest with beautiful views. Thank you to all who donated to this great program!

There have been many events and programs held at the park this summer including:

- A painting class for kids held in the Guest House for 2 weeks in August conducted by the Town of Aurora Recreation Department.
- Filming of "Diary of a Lunatic" (an Amazon Prime series) and a TV commercial at the end of July and beginning of August.
- The 6th Annual "Cross Country Crusade" on August 17th conducted by the Mercurio family. 100% of proceeds from this event go to Camp Good Days, to help kids with cancer and their families.
- Many popular interpretive programs that were filled to capacity, including nighttime firefly walks and kayak classes on the upper pond.
- A cyclocross on August 25th held around the Stable and the surrounding south-east end of the park. Approximately 160 people participated in this fun and exciting event.
- Several Yoga classes have been held in the Orchard located near the Native Landscape Materials

 Center
- Bark Bash with an incredible turn out and over-abundance of great dogs and dog owners.
- Over 10,000 Visitors during the music filled Borderland Festival

We have some events and projects still coming up this year. Several Cross Country events will be taking place throughout the fall, including High School "Sectionals" on November 8th, which will involve approximately 1,200 participants. A trail improvement project was put out to bid in July and a successful bidder was selected. This project involves removal of soil and adding gravel base and fine gravel surfacing on 3,174 linear feet of trail. This popular trail currently has no base or surfacing and has been just a mowed path through fields, which get very soggy and muddy during wet weather. The improved sections of trail will be from the "Red Barns" parking lot to the "upper woods" and then from the opposite corner of the "upper woods" nearly to Knox Road. We hope to see this project underway in the very near future.

That's all for now. Hope to see you all around at park!

Garden Updates:

It's been an eventful summer around the mansion gardens. Two big projects were accomplished this summer; both enhancing the beauty at the entrance to the mansion.

Through the generosity of our Friends, the hard work from our Garden Club volunteers, and the expertise and labor from Murray Bros. Landscaping, a new stone walk and improved landscaping was installed at the front of the building. Interested in becoming part of the gardening community at Knox? 

Knox Nature News


Another summer has passed and soon it will be time to break out our favorite jackets and hats. As with people, many plants and animals in the park are preparing for the colder months ahead. Chipmunks will be busy collecting nuts and fruits to store underground for leaner times, while migrating birds will be feeding heavily on the bounty of berries produced by shrubs such as dogwoods and viburnums. Trees themselves are not only producing berries, nuts and seeds but they are also going through changes in their leaves, something we all look forward to every year!

The famous colors of autumn have long been a mystery of nature. Originally frost was believed to be the main mechanism to producing such wonderful colors, but we now know it is a result of various pigments found within the leaf tissue itself. Every leaf is made of hundreds of thousands of small living cells, each being filled with blobs of colored chemicals or pigments. The most familiar to us is the green pigment which we know as chlorophyll. Chlorophyll is the key component in the production of food for the plant. It captures the suns energy to convert water and carbon dioxide into simple sugars. During this food making process, chlorophyll is continually broken down and replenished at a high rate, thus making the leaf appear green to our eyes. But come autumn the tree begins to slow its replenishing rate and more chlorophyll is used than replenished. This allows other pigments, which have always been present in the leaf, to finally reveal themselves to eager onlookers.

The new colors we see are compliments of carotenoids, the yellows, browns and oranges that now appear. Carotenoids are common in many living things. We see them in carrots, corn, daffodils, egg yolks and even in some species of birds! In the park this fall look for these brilliant colors in our hickories, ash, maples, tulip trees, aspens, sycamores and black cherry!

Yellows and oranges aren't the only colors we enjoy however. Reds and purples also decorate our autumn trees. These spectacular colors are courtesy of another group of pigments in the cells called anthocyanins. Unlike chlorophyll and carotenoids, anthocyanins are not present throughout the summer growing season. Their formation begins in late summer and is more complex. It is a result of a breakdown of sugars and the level of phosphate in the leaf. During the summer phosphate is abundant and is crucial for the breakdown of sugars, but in the autumn the phosphate is moved from the leaf and stored in the stem of the plant. This change alters the sugar breakdown process and anthocyanins are produced. The brighter the light during the process the more vibrant color display we see. Furthermore, the more acidic the liquid in the leaf is during this time, the more red we see. The more alkaline the liquids are the more purple we see. Look for the vibrant reds and purples in the park's dogwoods, red maples, grapes and some oak species.

Look for bright days and cool nights this fall as these conditions favor a colorful autumn; an early frost spoils the fun. Be sure to take a walk along the trails this fall and see which colors you can find. Every fall is different and it's a great way to enjoy our beautiful park!

Dog Park Rules

- Use the Park at your own risk. You are responsible for damage or injury inflicted by your dog(s). Knox Farm State Park will not be responsible for problems, accidents, damages, or injury occurring in the Dog Park.
- Dogs must be healthy, preferably spayed or neutered, current on all inoculations, and wearing a collar that displays license tags. Use proper area for your dog. Those under 30 pounds go in the Small Dog Area; those over 30 pounds go in the Large Dog Area.
- Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Handler must stay with and carry a leash for his/her dog(s) at all times. Limit is two (2) dogs per handler.
- No puppies under four months are allowed. No female dogs in heat are allowed.
 Any dog mounting another dog must be removed from the Dog Park.
- If a dog exhibits aggressive behavior or excessive barking, it must be leashed and removed from the Dog Park.
- No food, drink, or smoking in the Dog Park.
- Training treats are allowed.
- If your dog digs holes, please fill in.

ALWAYS CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG. BAG AND DISPOSE OF WASTE IN CONTAINERS PROVIDED.
